



From the Red River to the Mekong Delta

From the 2nd century CE to the 19th century, the people of the Red River and the Mekong Delta created art, architecture and feats of water engineering revealed in new archaeological research. Oc Eo, the early maritime trade centre drew merchants with cargoes from Rome, India and China.

The Ho Chi Minh City Museum collection conserves diverse masterpieces from the prehistoric Dong Son drums of the Red River Delta to the vibrant Hindu and Buddhist statuary of the former kingdoms of Champa in Central Vietnam.

An elegant 2.7m tall Buddha carved in hardwood has survived more than 1,000 years in the delta mud while a 29 cm bronze Buddha arrived on a trading ship from the 6th century Chinese Northern Qi dynasty. Very early Vishnu statues wear high mitres and Shiva's face stares out from stone lingas.

In addition, an immense collection of decorative arts showcases the riches of the last Vietnamese dynasty, the Nguyen.


Composed over 2,000 years ago, the Ramayana was brought to Southeast Asia in the first centuries CE, where the story of Rama's exile with his wife Sita, her abduction by the demon king Ravanna, her rescue and Rama's triumphant return to Ayodhaya, appealed to the kings of Siam, Cambodia and the Indonesian archipelago. The triumph of good over evil was evoked in stone carvings, drama, shadow puppets and mural paintings. The late Dr. Vittorio Royeda, examines the most significant examples in Thailand, the famous murals of the Grand Palace in Bangkok and in Cambodia, the delicate and expressive murals of Wat Bo, and the murals of the Silver Pagoda, Phnom Penh.







Explorer, Oriental scholar and diplomat, Pierre Lefèvre-Pontalis (1864-1938) was a member of the Pavie Mission to Laos in the 1890s, before 20 years later becoming Minister Plenipotentiary to the Kingdom of Siam. Before taking up his duties, he journeyed in Siam and Burma in late 1912, recording his ethnographic, historical and geopolitical thoughts in more than 500 pages in small notebooks. The wealth of details and information on Southeast Asia also provide a window to the colonial mindset of the period.

Hue, the ancient, royal capital, is one of the most beautiful World Heritage Sites in Vietnam. Despite a turbulent past much of its classical architecture survives in the Imperial Citadel, in the Hue Museum of Royal Fine Arts and in Nguyen mausoleums in the Valley of the Tombs.



In 1911, Prince Chakrabongse and his wife Katya (Ekaterina Desnitskaya) made an epic journey by boat and train, across one third of the globe. They were returning to St. Petersburg where in 1905 they fell in love and eloped.

For Katya, after five difficult years in Bangkok, it was the first time she would see her family; for the prince it was the first time he would revisit the Tsar who had treated him like a member of the family. While Katya went to stay in Kyiv with her family, Prince Chakrabongse went to London to represent King Rama VI at the coronation of King George V.

Throughout the journey from Bangkok by to Shanghai, to Vladivostok and the Trans-Siberian railway Chakrabongse kept a detailed diary, as well as an account of the coronation.


